(FOR uj) v.

to search or hunt for food and provisions

Link: **FOREST**



*“Wild animals **FORAGING**
for food in the **FOREST**”*

- When the last of our provisions were gone, it was decided that two men would take our only rifle and go **FORAGING** for game.
 - We **FORAGED** through the shed for plywood, tin sheets, and boards, anything with which to board up the windows and doors before the full force of the hurricane struck.
 - After the campers fell asleep in their tents, the raccoons began **FORAGING** through the camp site for anything to eat.

FORBEAR

(for BEAR) v.

to do without; to leave alone;
to refrain from; to abstain

Link: **FOUR BEARS**



*"Please **FORBEAR** feeding the **FOUR BEARS**."*

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- ❑ To **FORBEAR** giving your opinion on any controversial matter until you have first heard all the facts is generally the wisest course of action.
 - ❑ Jeannie said it was difficult to **FORBEAR** from smoking after doing it for thirty years.
 - ❑ Henry **FORBORE** his decision to close the store, deciding to wait until after the Christmas season.

FORSAKE

(for SAKE) v.

to abandon, to give up, to renounce

Link: **FOUR SNAKES**



*“The Higgins family wisely decided to **FORSAKE** their campsite in favor of **FOUR SNAKES**.”*

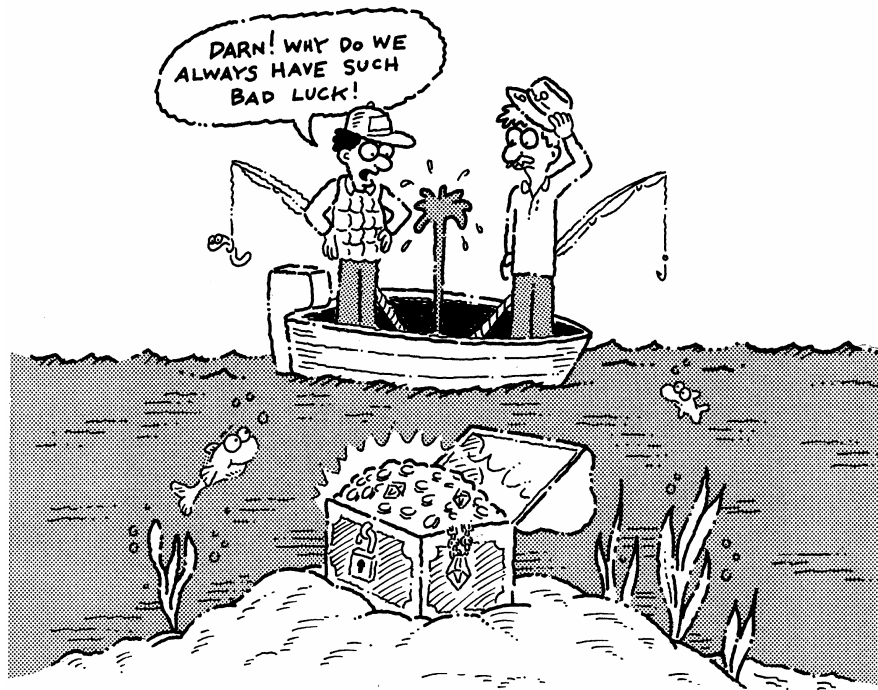
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- ❑ The parents urged their daughter to **FORSAKE** her career as a model and return to their home to become a school teacher.
 - ❑ All the general’s troops had **FORSAKEN** him, and he had no choice but to follow them and return to safe ground.
 - ❑ Ben **FORSOOK** his career of politics and became a university professor.

FORTUITOUS

(for TWO ih tus) *adj.*

good fortune occurring by accident or chance

Link: **FORTUNE FOR THE TWO OF US**



"A FORTUITOUS FORTUNE FOR THE TWO OF US"

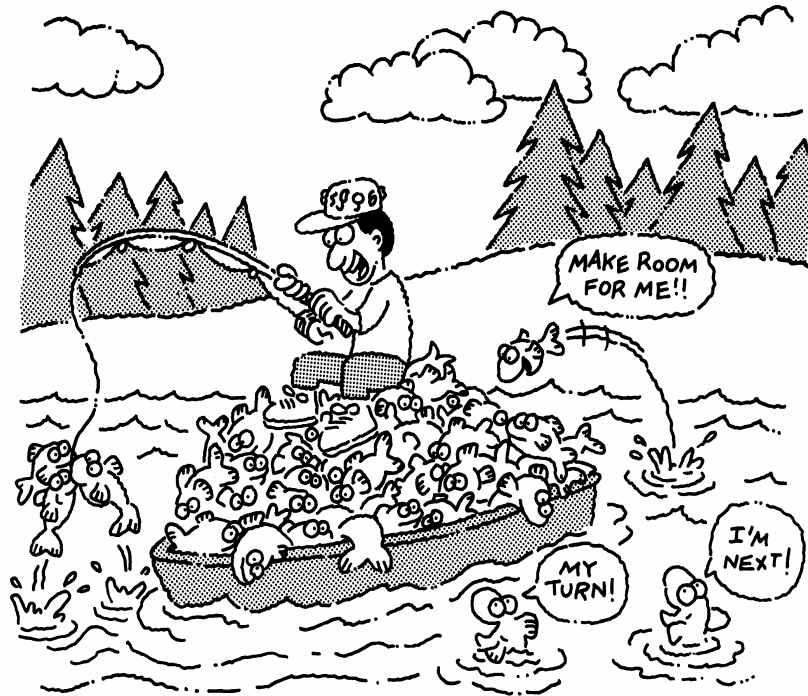
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- It was a series of **FORTUITOUS** events that advanced my career in television.

FRAUGHT

(frawt) *n.*

teeming with; laden; full;
involving; accompanied by

Link: **CAUGHT**



*“Eric **CAUGHT** a boatload in a lake **FRAUGHT** with fish.”*

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- ❑ The freighter was **FRAUGHT** with cargo.
 - ❑ Although Mark Twain’s books were **FRAUGHT** with humor, they nevertheless drove home good advice for their readers, young and old.
 - ❑ Kathy was **FRAUGHT** with guilt about losing her temper with the children when she found out it wasn’t their fault.

GAMIN

(GAM in) *n.*

a neglected boy left to run about in the streets

“A **JAMMIN'** GAMIN”

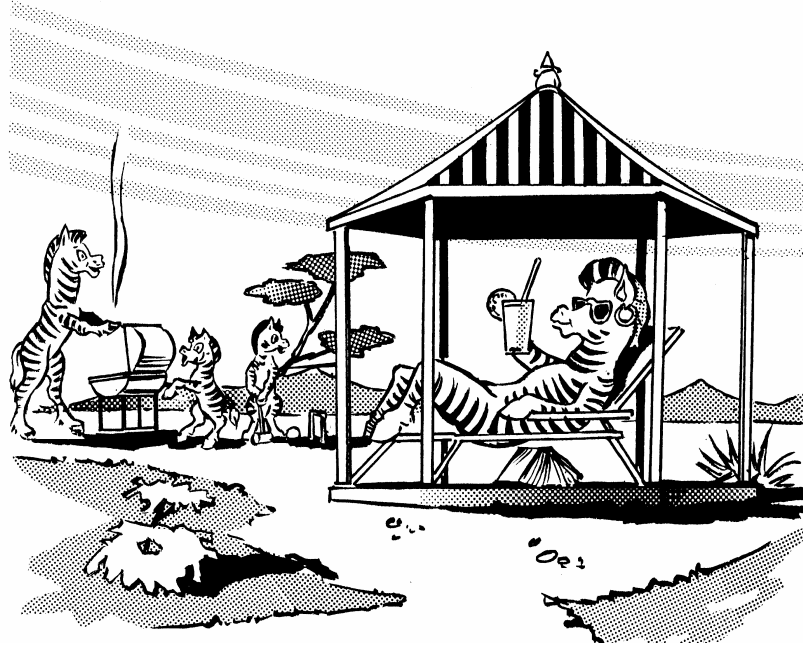
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- ❑ In India, everywhere our tour bus stopped, there would be a gang of **GAMINS** begging for money, but if you dared give a rupee to one, a hundred more would immediately appear.
 - ❑ In the novel, *Oliver Twist*, we learn of the intolerable living conditions in English orphanages of the nineteenth century and the life of the many homeless, streetwise **GAMINS**.

GAZEBO

(guh ZEE boh) *n.*

an outdoor structure with a roof and open sides

*“A **ZEBRA GAZEBO** on the Mari Mari Plains of Kenya, East Africa”*

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- ❑ A **GAZEBO** is most always found in a backyard or park.
 - ❑ The **GAZEBO** in the mission courtyard was used for weddings in the summer. In the winter, goats would come and huddle together to stay warm and out of the rainy weather.
 - ❑ On Sunday afternoons the family would gather together in the shade of our backyard **GAZEBO**.
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GENERALIZE

(JEN ur ul ize) v.

general rather than specific; to form a general conclusion

Link: **GENERAL'S EYES**



*“To say that all **GENERALS’ EYES** are the same is to **GENERALIZE.**”*

- ❑ Wilma’s problem was she always **GENERALIZED**. Everything was either always bad or always good, and she could never specifically say what she liked or disliked.
 - ❑ Our teacher asked us to be specific when answering the test questions and avoid **GENERALIZING**.
 - ❑ To say that all politicians are crooks and all lawyers are honest is to **GENERALIZE**.

GIDDY

(GID ee) *adj.*

a light-headed sensation; dizzy;
lightheartedly silly

*“Farmer John gets a little **GIDDY** every time he goes to the **CITY**.”*

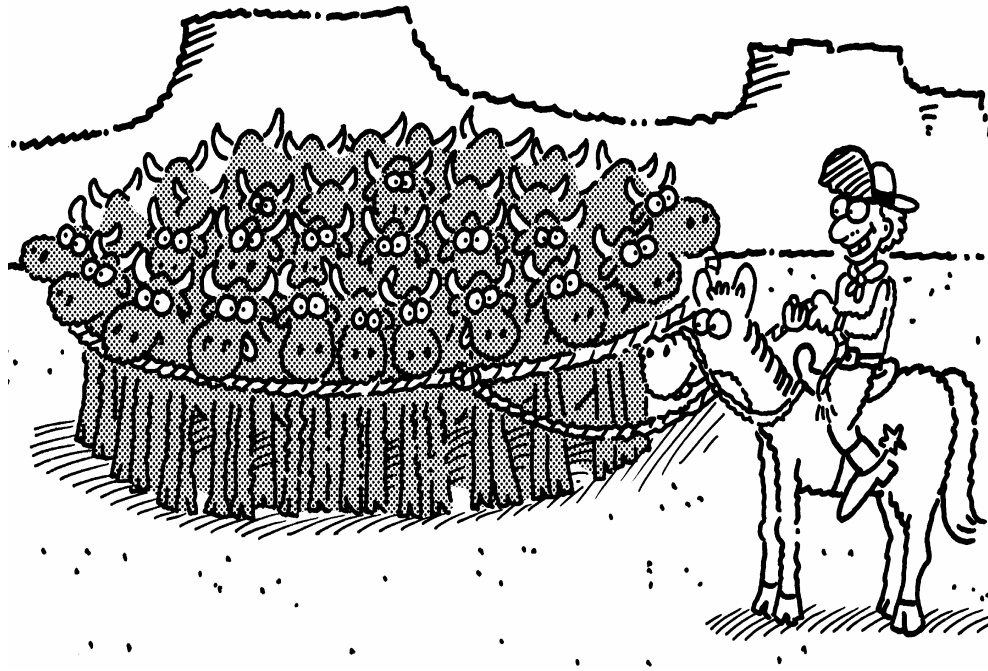
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- ❑ After Sue won the beauty contest, she was absolutely **GIDDY** with joy.

(gird) v.

to encircle as with a belt;
to prepare as for action

Link: **HERD**

with his trusty lasso.”*

- Johnny’s job each week of the soccer season was to **GIRD** the field with a line of white chalk to mark the boundaries of the playing field.
 - Dad’s bath robe is **GIRDED** with a terry cloth belt.
 - **GIRDED** for action, the tanks moved forward into battle formation.
