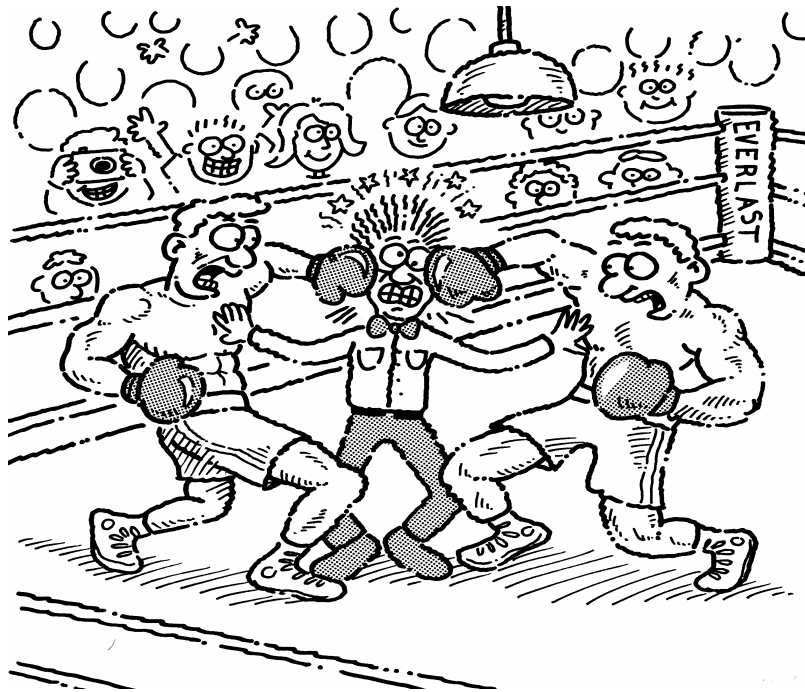


PERIPHERY

the outermost part within a boundary,
the outside edge

Link: **REFEREE**

the **PERIPHERY** of a boxer’s reach.”*

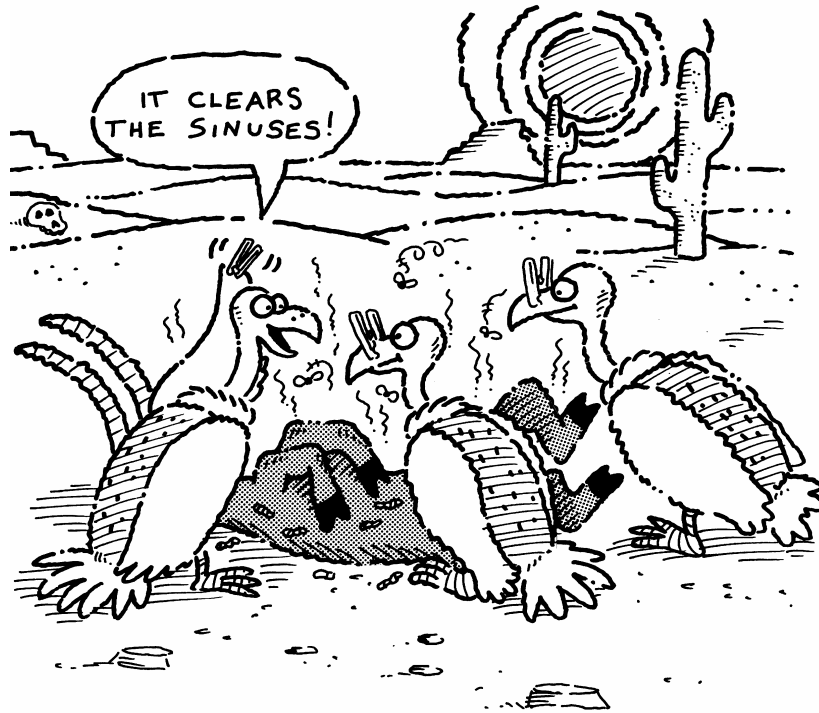

PERMEATE

(PUR mee ayt) v.

to flow or spread through; penetrate

PERMEATED the carcass.”*

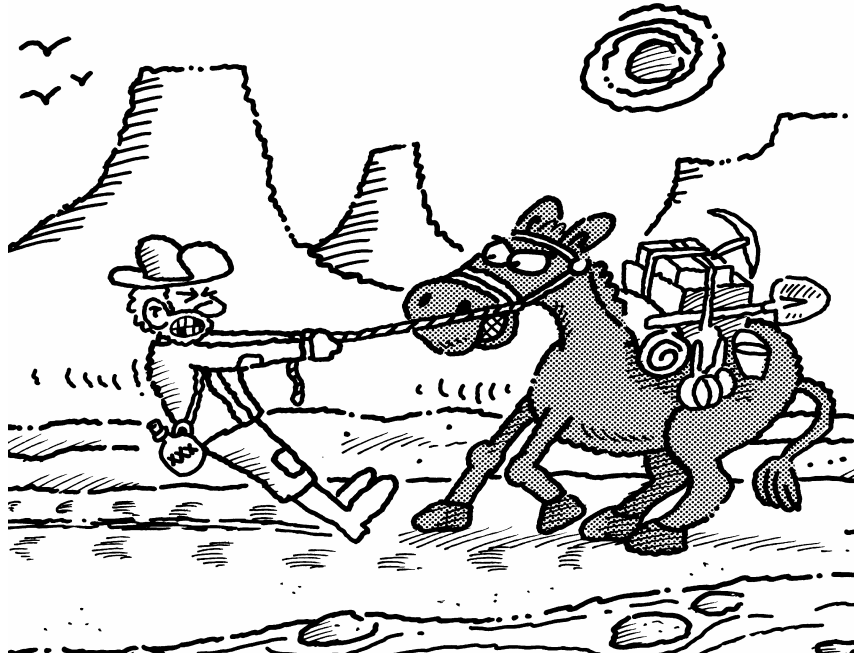

PERVERSE

(pur VERS) *adj.*

stubborn; contrary; intractable

Link: **REVERSE**



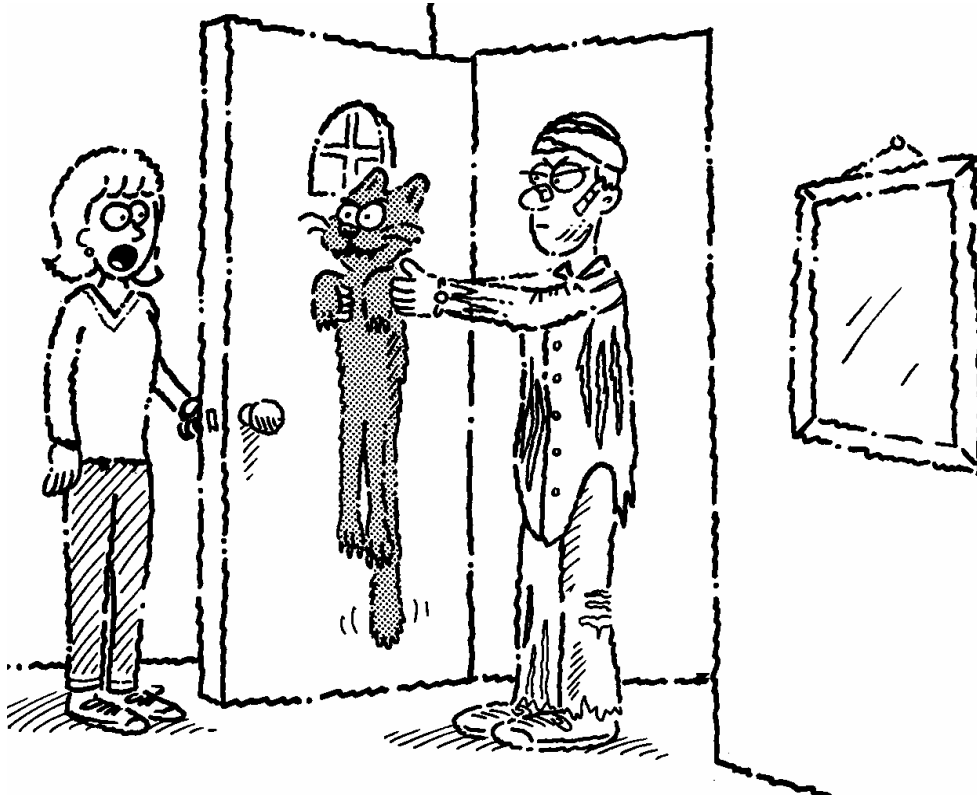
*“Deadwood Dick’s horse was so **PERVERSE** he often would go in **REVERSE**.”*

- ❑ Our neighbor Mike is a hateful person who takes a **PERVERSE** pleasure in having the worse kept lawn in the neighborhood.
 - ❑ The **PERVERSE** referee would not change his call even though the replay showed he was wrong.
 - ❑ The **PERVERSENESS** of the hunting guide was apparent; he had returned to camp without us and we were lost in the woods within the hour.

PETULANT

(PEH chew lunt) *adj.*
ill-humored, irritable, cranky

 - ❑ The **PETULANT** old man sat on his porch and yelled at us for walking across his lawn.

PHILANTHROPY

(fuh LAN thruh pee) *n.*

love of mankind, especially through charitable gifts and deeds

- ❑ Football star Warrick Dunn is also known for his **PHILANTHROPY**, he helps underprivileged families own their own homes.
 - ❑ In the movie, *Good Sam*, Gary Cooper's character was so **PHILANTHROPIC**, giving to anyone in need and keeping so little for his own family, that his wife left him. (*adj.*)
 - ❑ Mike is not only a real estate tycoon but he is also known as a **PHILANTHROPIST** because he gives millions to charity every year. (*n.*)

PHOBIA

(FOH bee uh) *n.*

a persistent, illogical fear

*“Some natives have a **PHOBIA** about **PHOTOS**, believing their*

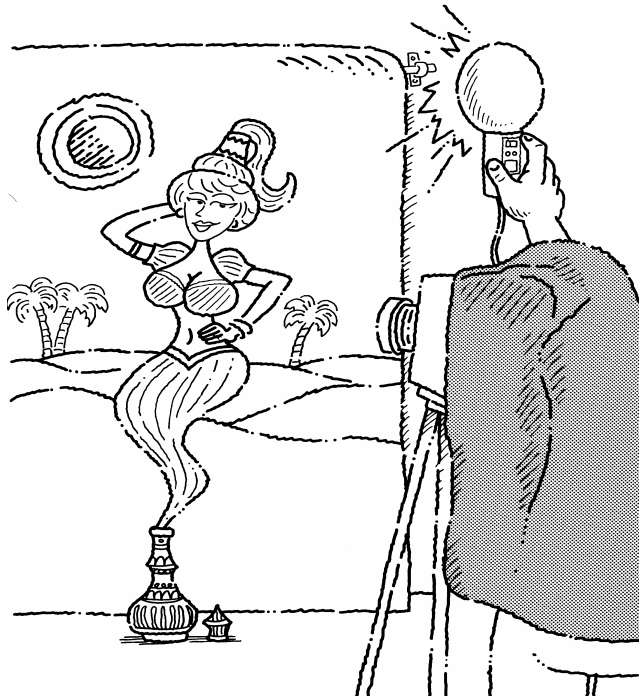

(foh tuh JEN ik) *adj.*

suitable, especially attractive for photography

(pide) *adj.*

having patches or blotches
of two or more colors

PILLAGE

(PIL luhj) v.

to rob of goods by violent seizure,
plunder; to take as spoils

Link: **VILLAGE**



*“Blackbeard the Pirate gives last
minute orders before they
PILLAGE the **VILLAGE**.”*

- ❑ The enemy invaders **PILLAGED** the village, taking everything not tied down and killing the cows and chickens.
 - ❑ After the kids and their school friends **PILLAGED** the refrigerator, there was nothing left but a little catsup and mustard.
 - ❑ Pirates are known **PILLAGERS**. (n.)

PIQUE

(peek) *n./v.*

irritation, resentment stemming from wounded pride; to arouse curiosity

Link: **PEEK**



*“Jo Ann was **PIQUED** at her brother for **PEEKING** at her slumber party.”*

- ❑ The three sisters showed their **PIQUE** at not being invited to their cousin’s wedding by their refusal to send wedding presents. (*n.*)
 - ❑ Joey said he was **PIQUED** at the chemistry teacher for giving out final grades before he had time to finish his lab work. (*v.*)
 - ❑ The sound of the car horn **PIQUED** our curiosity until we saw our neighbor had accidentally pressed it while backing out of his driveway. (*v.*)
