UMBRAGE

(UM brij) *n.* sense of injury or insult; to take offense, displeasure

Link: **DUMB BRIDGE**



"Mike, the engineer, took **UMBRAGE** when people called it a **DUMB BRIDGE**."

- Polly took **UMBRAGE** when her husband told her she was wearing too much makeup.
- "I take **UMBRAGE** at your remarks about my golf game," Theodore said jokingly to his regular golf partner. "I'm the only one you can beat."
- Please don't take **UMBRAGE** of my criticisms, I am only trying to tell the truth.

UNBRIDLED

(un BRIDE duld) *adj.* violent, unbounded, unrestrained

Link: **BRIDLE**




"A wild horse without a **BRIDLE** can be an **UNBRIDLED** demon to ride."

- It is small wonder the children in that family are always in trouble; they are **UNBRIDLED** and do whatever they please.
- In last-minute desperation, the candidate made an UNBRIDLED speech full of deceitful accusations he hoped would discredit the mayor.
- Andrea's UNBRIDLED passion for dancing was evident in every performance she gave.

VEER

(veer) v. to change direction

Link: PIER



"Vern, I told you to **VEER** at the end of the **PIER**."

- When you arrive at the castle, VEER left around the wall and follow the foot trail until you come to the valley.
- Without warning, Flight #638 suddenly VEERED off the runway and slammed into a small plane parked outside the hanger. Fortunately no one was seriously hurt.
- Arthur never VEERED from the path of honor and dignity.

VERBATIM

(ver BAY tum) *n.* using exactly the same words, word for word

Link: VERN'S BAT




"VERN wrote his coach's batting instructions VERBATIM on his BAT."

- The coach called the team together and said from that moment on, every player who wanted to stay on the team had to obey his rules VERBATIM.
- □ The young actress had a tough time learning her lines **VERBATIM**.
- Polly, the parrot, will repeat whatever is said to him VERBATIM.

VERTIGO

(VUR tih go) *n.* the sensation of dizziness

Link: WHERE TO GO



"When test pilot Bill developed a bad case of **VERTIGO**, he didn't know **WHERE TO GO**."

- Charles was acrophobic and even suffered from VERTIGO while standing on a stool, replacing the lights in the kitchen.
- A person said to have acrophobia is someone who has a fear of great heights. Typically, acrophobes suffer from VERTIGO if they are in a tall building and look down.
- Dad said he couldn't ride any of the amusement park rides that spin because they gave him **VERTIGO**.

VOLITION

(voh LISH un) *n.* an act of choosing, using one's own will in a conscious choice

Link: GO FISHIN'



"Of his own **VOLITION**, Bryan would have preferred to **GO FISHIN**'."

- Mom was surprised when Laura ordered a veggie sandwich of her own **VOLITION**; she normally despises vegetables.
- Dave decided to join the Army of his own VOLITION in lieu of going to college.
- □ The dean asked Peter if he was joining a fraternity because of peer pressure or of his own **VOLITION**.

WANE

(wayn) v. to decrease gradually

Link: RAIN




"Snowmen WANE in the RAIN."

- Marilyn's interest in a new beau began to WANE when she discovered Jack had invited three other girls as his date for the junior prom.
- With a WANING of air in his air tank, the diver knew he had to return to the surface.
- □ A **WANING** interest by theater-goers prompted the theater to shut down.

WITHER

(WITH ur) *v./adj.* to become dry; shriveled, shrunken, dried-up



"Too much sun and too little rain makes corn WITHER in the summer WEATHER."

- □ The crop **WITHERED** from the lack of rain. (v.)
- A few WITHERED apples were all that remained on the tree after the pickers had worked their way through the orchard. (adj.)
- Interest in the space program WITHERED after the moon landing. (v.)

WREST

(rest) v. to pull away, take by violence

Link: WRIST




"The policeman grabbed the thief by the WRIST and WRESTED away his gun."

- Police will tell you that in dealing with a person who threatens you with a knife or a club, it is the best policy not to attempt to WREST the weapon away from them.
- When it was clear that the driver had too much to drink, the passengers WRESTED the keys away from him for their own safety.
- □ The excited puppy **WRESTED** the stick from the boy's hand.

YORE

(yohr) *n.* former days, an era long past

Link: FLOOR



"In days of **YORE**, folks slept on the **FLOOR**."

- (YORE is generally to be seen in the phrase "days of YORE.") In days of YORE, my sister and I had to walk five miles to school in waist-deep snow.
- □ In the days of **YORE** we didn't have the luxuries of airconditioning, televisions and home computers.
- The ships of YORE were powered by the wind or the muscle of oarsmen.
