CATHARSIS

(kuh THAR sis) *n.* an emotional or psychological cleansing that brings relief or renewal

Link: CATS AND HORSES




"CAT AND HORSE CATHARSIS"

CAUCUS

(KAW kus) *n.* a meeting of the members of a political party to make decisions


"A CACTUS CAUCUS"

CERTIFY

(SUR tuh fie) *v.* to confirm formally; verify

Link: HURT A FLY




"George Washington never told a lie, and he would **CERTIFY** that he never **HURT A FLY**."

CHASM

(KAZ um) *n.* a deep opening in the earth's surface; a gorge; differences of opinion, interests, loyalties

CHATTEL

(CHAT ul) an item of personal, movable property; slave

CHIDE

(chide) v.

to scold; to voice disapproval

"The good fairy **CHIDED**Pinocchio because he **LIED**."


- When Bobby threw his toys against the wall, his father

CHRONIC

(KRAHN ik) adj.

continuing for a long time; continuous

CIRCA

(SUR ka) *prep.* at, in or of approximately; at an estimated historical time period

"The first known **CIRCUS** took place **CIRCA** 200,000 BC."

- □ The exact date of the first Egyptian dynasty is not known, but it is believed to have occurred CIRCA 3000 BC.
- □ **CIRCA** is another word for "about" or "more or less," and always refers to a passage of time.
- □ John is an expert on weapons produced CIRCA 1800.

CITADEL

(SIT uh dl) n.

a fortress overlooking a city; a stronghold

Link: SIT WELL



"It pays to **SIT WELL** on the edge of a **CITADEL**."

- Charlie was a CITADEL of strength, always there for you no matter what.
- West Point is considered a CITADEL of military learning, a fact easily understood when you come to understand that most generals attended West Point.
- There are many ancient CITADELS in Spain; they are among the attractions most visited by tourists.
